Forms of Municipal Government

Forms of Government

Council-Manager

Characteristics include:

- City council oversees the general administration, makes policy, sets budget
- operations Council appoints a professional city manager to carry out day-to-day administrative
- Often the mayor is chosen from among the council on a rotating basis

Forms of Government continued:

Mayor-Council

- Characteristics include:
- Mayor is elected separately from the council, is often full-time and paid, with significant administrative and budgetary authority
- Depending on the municipal charter, the mayor could have weak or strong powers
- Council is elected and maintains legislative powers
- administrative authority Some cities appoint a professional manager who maintains limited

Forms of Government continued.

Commission

- Characteristics include:
- Voters elect individual commissioners to a small governing board
- Each commissioner is responsible for one specific aspect, such as fire, police, public works, health, finance
- One commissioner is designated as chairman or mayor, who presides over meetings
- The commission has both legislative and executive functions

Forms of Government contd.

Town Meeting

- Characteristics include:
- All voters meet to decide basic policy and elect officials to carry out those policies
- Although the town meeting form of government is generally viewed as the purest decisions, it is practiced in only 5% of municipalities. form of democracy, because it allows all eligible voters a voice in local policy

Forms of Government Cont'd

Representative Town Meeting


- Characteristics include:
- where only they can vote Voters select a large number of citizens to represent them at town meetings,
- time and location of the meeting and specifies the items to be discussed Each town meeting must be announced with a warrant that provides the date,
- The selectmen are responsible for implementing policy

Types of Mayors



- Weak or Strong Mayors
- Most "strong" mayors are in the mayor-council form of government, and are directly elected by citizens to that office. Most "weak" mayors are mayors in a council-manager form, and are elected from within the city
- Characteristics of a "strong" mayor:
- The mayor is the chief executive officer, centralizing executive power.
- The mayor directs the administrative structure, appointing and removing of department heads
- While the council has legislative power, the mayor has veto power.
- The council does not oversee daily operations.
- Characteristics of a "weak" mayor:
- The council is powerful, with both legislative and executive authority.
- The mayor is not truly the chief executive, with limited power or no veto power.
- The council can prevent the mayor from effectively supervising city administration.
- There may be many administrative boards and commissions that operate independently from the city government.

Mayoral Powers



These responsibilities may include:

- Serving on the city council;
- Voting in council meetings;
- Assigning council members to chair or serve on committees;
- Appointing citizens to serve on advisory boards or
- commissions;
- Making an annual report to the council.

Council Powers

Review and approve the annual budget;

Establish long- and short-term objectives and priorities;

Oversee performance of the local public employees;

Oversee effectiveness of programs;

Establish tax rates;

Enter into legal contracts;

Borrow funds;

Pass ordinances and resolutions;

Modify the city's charter;

Regulate land use through zoning laws;

Regulate business activity through licensing and regulations;


Regulate public health and safety;

Exercise the power of eminent domain;

Communicate policies and programs to residents;

Respond to constituent needs and complaints; and


Represent the community to other levels of government.



Where do we get our money?

General fund-Cities collect property and sales tax to fund general governmental functions such as:

Street & Drainage, Police, Fire, Parks and the general administration services that support these functions i.e. Finance, City management, and Human resources etc..





Where do we get our \$ Cont'd

Enterprise funds (business like) Cities collect fees for the services provided to the user and transfer into the general funds for administrative support. Examples of an enterprise or proprietary fund are:
